A pleasant image of three women in shirtwaists sitting just behind the sandy strand of what is almost certainly Cedar Point, Ohio, with the short-lived Three Way Figure Eight Roller Toboggan (built in 1902 and razed in 1910) in the background; one woman reads a book, the title of which is (alas) unreadable in this photo. Cedar Point (near Sandusky) has had a long history as a place for recreation and amusement; the first roller coaster was built there in 1899 and its roller coasters remain the principal attraction today. Small contemporary Indiana owner's ink inscription on the verso. Some light soiling and wear; in very good condition.

A detailed example of serious amateur sport, perhaps assembled by a spouse or family member, of a Dravosburg, Penna., coal barge captain (per his 2006 obituary), Clarence E. "Bim" Argyle—who, to judge from this album, followed his true avocation by playing baseball for semi-pro and amateur teams in the 1940s and for competitive softball teams in the 1950s and 1960s. With candid shots of Bim and teammates in such situations as "Steel Worker Champs 1949," or at the 1948 World Baseball Tournament in Marysville, Tenn., or in baseball uniform and posing on Okinawa in 1945, or in candid and posed shots with a softball team in 1959 and 1960.

The captions throughout certainly evoke the culture of the period, with such nick-names as Razz, Lump, Bud, Bim, Yawza, and Popeye making appearances. Also mounted throughout are newspaper clippings about Bim's teams or box scores of games, with the addition of three letters on Pittsburgh Pirates subjects (one from the Pirates farm system in response to a tip on a player, one on the unavailability of old Pirates uniforms for purchase, and one a typed letter on Pittsburgh Pirates letterhead dated August 7, 1951 and signed by General Manager and Hall of Fame member Branch Rickey regretting that the Pirates organization has no openings for employment). The album also includes a mounted signed photo of Pirates great Ralph Kiner. The album is annotated throughout in white ink and gives an in-depth look at the serious business of recreation in working class western Pennsylvania. One team portrait appears to be missing, otherwise the album appears substantially complete. Some light rubbing and wear to the album covers; clippings browning; in very good condition throughout.



A flipbook animation demonstrating proper technique for this baton twirling trick. With a number of ads on the versos of the illustrated pages for various models of Gamble batons and Gamble instructional booklets. "Every boy has a hobby, and my hobby was fighting."

An entertaining promotional memoir for a Philadelphia boxer, cigar store owner, and sometime dog trainer McCloskey (b. 1872), known as "the Old War Horse of the Prize Ring," with vivid anecdotes of his days in the ring, his training regimen (maintained despite his retirement since going blind in 1902), and his professional record: "I never 'jobbed' or quit; nor was I ever knocked out. I also defy anyone to refute this latter statement. I simply quit my profession because of losing my eyesight, as at present I am totally blind. In addition, let me say that I did not have to quit because I was a 'dead one' or a 'has been.'"

In addition to his career in the ring, McCloskey played of a role in the history of American art; he appears as a subject in one of the paintings done by Philadelphia fight fan Thomas Eakins, whose *Between Rounds* shows McCloskey working as a corner man for local featherweight Billy Smith at a fight in 1898, and would additionally round up other boxers to pose for Eakins, who had a boxing ring installed in his studio. With a notice on the inside front wrapper, "This book written in 1915. No Revisions or Additions made since, with exception of back cover." (Comparison with an earlier edition reveals that the pamphlet was indeed reset.) With an advertisement from McCloskey on the inside rear wrapper thanking his wife and urging all who pity McCloskey to patronize the cigar store she operates for the family; he alludes to his mother having been dead some ten years, placing this sometime later than 1925. The rear outer wrapper notes, "These pictures were taken February 1st, 1916," and noting "The Blind Pugilist and his little pupil give 'Boxing Exhibitions' throughout the country." With a few performance details penciled in: Dunsworth will be at the Center School on Sat. night, Dec. the 4 (which would suggest 1869 or 1875). An ephemeral promotional pamphlet for a once well-known performing midget child from Framingham, Mass., the then nine-year-old Dollie Dutton—who in 1860 stood 29 inches high—with favorable notices from the press, verses composed in her honor, examples of songs she performs, and brief anecdotes of her life and her "levees." The cover vignette shows Miss Dutton standing on her father's outstretched palm. OCLC notes an apparent 1859 edition with a [Boston?] imprint, though this is likely the same undated edition as this. 

The McGibney family might be excused for looking upon the Von Trapp family with perhaps a hint of condescension—per the extensive printed promotional material on the verso of the 1883 card.

Their home is at Portland, Oregon. They number fourteen in all, father, mother and twelve children . . . and constitute a *full band*, a full orchestra and chorus, and their programme is so different from all others, that it has attracted thousands and been praised everywhere, and consists of Gems of Music, in Cornet Solos and Duets, Band and Orchestral Selections, Vocal Solos, Glees, Choruses and Laughable Sketches that cannot be described, but must be seen to be appreciated.

With additional press notices and a blank stamped in ink Jun. 4, 1883 (when they will be appearing "in this city"). The 1883 card notes the family as under management of B. S. Driggs and shows the lineup of 13 McGibney family members; the 1884 card (backed on card stock and restored a bit along the lower corners) shows the infant McGibney and the 14 McGibney roster. (One located newspaper report dated 1891 notes *eighteen* McGibney band members on stage, suggesting either unparalleled fecundity coupled with prodigy on the part of the McGibney parents—or perhaps at least a couple ringers.) Somewhat worn and a bit creased in spots; in good condition.

"He gently kicks off a right show, pulls forth a small key, inserts it in the lock of a long black car, gets in and slowly pulls away—not giving it a thought that he is known the World over as 'The Famous Armless Musician.'" So beings this promotional pamphlet for perhaps the foremost armless country music lap steel guitar player of the period, giving some sense of his life and achievements up through his return to his native Pennsylvania to promote his own radio show after a number of years doing shows on West Virginia radio stations. With the expected halftone views of Myers firing a shotgun, smoking a cigarette, etc. Wrappers stained and somewhat worn and browned, including a light beer-mug sized stain to the front wrapper; in good, sound condition.

The whole vocabulary laboratory of our government is involved in economy and harmony of self-evident evidences with self-evident elements, of theory and practice, of faith and works. Faith, founded on evidence, is the great fundamental principle of all principles with works; and the primary origin of the literary, scientific, philosophical, mechanical, physical and organic world; and the social, civil, political and religious world,—from a needle to a navy, and from a penny whistle to an organ. Man without education a blank.

Notwithstanding the ninety-seven years history of experiments of our government, as to the science of government, we are in our infancy; deluged in discords, bigotry, faith not founded on evidence but circumstantial, fiction, fancy, imagination, imitation and speculaton, fast running the whole nation into confusion, delusion and moral chaos, a leap into the dark abyss of total depravity. Most everything is running into extravagant speculations. Preaching, Lecturing and music, too often charming the savage breast and lulling an iniquity to sleep.

The people are hungry for good sound knowledge, wisdom, understanding and judgment, with good common-sense and mother wit, of economical and harmonious Preachers, Lecturers and writers. The press of Boston are making great progress, I am on good terms with them, I get their papers. The people pay more money every year for repulsive and destructive elements that are filling up the criminal courts, poor houses, hospitals, insane hospitals and prisons, enough to pay off our National debt. "Pro bono publico." And the people pay money enough for Foreign Missions every year to feed, clothe and house all the poor men, women and children in America. The Bible is turned too much into speculation and merchandise, more theory than practice. Faith has almost become a dead letter. The world is full of saving elements, and man is dependent on all the properties of the four kingdoms, mineral, vegetable, animal and invisible life to perpetuate his Being. "Multum in parvo."

My history has been enough to discourage and put down a million ordinary men. And I have been abused and sacrificed in most all points of view, all but my life, a thousand times more than Jesus Christ was by the Jews. I can write a Bible in harmony with the Creator and his works. More than half of my history has been devoted to travelling, studying human nature, the creation and the science of our government. No inspiration, melody or value in subjects or objects without communication and harmony. I have found the students of a hundred of Educational Institutions and Colleges to be charitable and hospitable, the last twenty-five years of my mission to them. The Colleges, Economy and Harmony are the hope of the American Government. "Vox populi, vox dei."

I have travelled over two hundred thousand miles, been to Washington, D. C., seventeen times, and amongst sixteen tribes of Indians, and helped elect Messrs. Harrison, Taylor, Lincoln and Grant, all without pay. I have had over two hundred public receptions. The students of Dartmouth College gave me a grand reception October 8th, 1873. Let all the individuals of the colleges, churches and the press harmonize all the cardinal virtues, with the attributes of the Creator. We have no government without woman's virtues.

I am going in for the interest of the Pennsylvania Central, New York Central, Michigan Central, Boston & Albany and the Union Pacific Railroads, &c.

To the Railroad companies,—I have some valuable ideas for them, to protect their property and human life. (Press please copy.)

No complete transcripts of any of the Great American Traveller's addresses have been found; his literary output tends to be ephemeral and fugitive, as here. 



He started February 19, 1949, and plans to spend at least fourteen months in the car, traveling 140,000 miles through every state in the country, to win a \$25,000 wager."

The erstwhile professor and one-man band sits in a photo studio holding a violin and showing off his rather complicated automaton of rollers and lines attached to a cello, a guitar, and a musical triangle. A search of patent records indicates that Charles S. As noted by Ricky Jay in *Jay's Journal of Anomolies*, "the Velasquez account not only achieved universal popularity, it also transcended veracity." A narrative purporting to be an account of an archeological adventure in discovery of a lost city in the jungles of South America, complete with a hair-raising escape from the lost Mayan city of Iximaya, betrayal at the hands of a Mayan maiden, and a human sacrifice, published in support of the exhibition of Maximo and Bartola, "the surviving remnant of an ancient and singular order of priesthood called Kaanas," who were also billed as "the greatest ethnological curiosities in living form that ever appeared among civilized men." The Aztec Lilliputians (as the act became known) were immensely popular through the 1850s, taken up by Barnum in the 1860s, and made resurfaced periodically over the next half century. Sabin 98812 (making no distinction for priority between three different New York imprints); Field 1598: "It is the most circumstantial fiction which the brain of an advertising agent ever conceived." When the walkathon and dance marathon crazes of the 1930s hit, Portland, Oregon theater owner Walter E. Tebbetts stood ready to profit and, acting in the capacity of a sort of inverted Horace Greeley, he took his promotional expertise east! To New Jersey! where he began to promote walkathon events. (Walkathons were evidently not all about walking, but incorporated elements of dance and novelty contests as well, *viz*. "the cot scene" or the Reverse Whirlwind — "Two Falls and Out!" —each mentioned here. The programs also stress the strict rules for the contests and the presence of trained medical staff at the events at all times.)

The programs here include advertisements for the daily walkathon radio shows heard on radio station WTNJ, list the couples competing in various events (including the World Championship Walkathon, Central Airport, Camden, N. J.), and include notice of attractions appearing at the events—the band Ira Coffey and His Walkathonians are noted as making appearances in each of the programs here. (The so-called championship in Camden lists as one of its emcees Red Skelton, who had in fact met his first wife at a walkathon in 1930.) One program includes a small gossip column, and each has been annotated in pencil, evidently by a contemporary fan or participant (next to the pairing of Red Reilly and Bev Vollack, and arrow pointing to Bev has been penciled, along with the comment "There goes my heart"). The three promotional postcards show participating couples, each with a printed note in the image about the walkathon and a sentiment printed on each image: "Your Friends, Helen + Joe #8" and "Many Happy Returns, Richard + Bobbie #12" and "Dancingly Yours, Jeanne King and Jimmie Perry." It is not the purpose of the author to give a detailed scientific account of Dr. Tanner's Fasts in this little work, but rather to present to the public an authentic history of this wonderful man. . . . That much benefit will result from Dr. Tanner's successful experiment there can be no question, but we cannot, it so short a time, estimate the full value of all the lessons to be learned.

An uncommon and up-to-the-minute account of one of the celebrated feats of public dietary abstention of the 19th century, this account published immediately after the 40-day fast undertaken in 1880 by Dr. Tanner for a prize of \$1,000; the premium had been offered by Dr. William A. Hammond, the debunker of Mollie Fancher, the Brooklyn Fasting Girl. Tanner appears to have been at the very least a popular success (though Hammond was to denounce him as a "fraud and a humbug"); he received at least one offer of marriage, numerous letters of support, and the wondering admiration of select members of the medical community. This pamphlet gives a detailed account of the supposed fast and suggests Tanner's achievement proves the power of mind over matter. Gunn was a New York surgeon in the eclectic medical school who merits brief mention in the Atwater catalogue.
